Happy Sunday, Team Grace! As we continue our walk through Ordinary Time, we are once again presented with the teachings of the Lord Jesus. And, once again, we are invited to accept him as Lord and to follow him as his disciples.

The Sunday Mass readings follow a three-year cycle, based on the Synoptic Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. This year, we're reading the Gospel of Matthew. Today, we are presented with the two Great Commandments, to love God and to love our neighbor. How are we doing in these areas? Are we pursuing the most excellent way of love in our lives?

This weekend, we return (and conclude) our summary of contemporary issues. So far, we've discussed *Life Issues and Human Dignity, Immigration and the Common Good, The LGBTQ Movement and Complementarity,* and *The Environment and Stewardship.* Today, we conclude with a review of *Law and Justice*.
