After last weekend's celebration of All Saints, we now return to Ordinary Time. During this season, portions of the Lord's teachings are given to us at Mass so that we can recommit ourselves to him. These selections are on a three-year cycle based on the Synoptic Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Currently, we are still in Matthew's Gospel.

This Sunday, and next Sunday (November 15), I'll be returning to the theme of endof-life care. These are pressing questions that we will all face (or have faced) in one way or another. This mini-series of homilies fits within the overall observance of November as the month of the dead.

Speaking of end-of-life care, I was honored to speak with the Order of Malta in Greensboro this past Thursday evening. The Order is committed to the defense of the faith and the care of the sick. It was a pleasure to be with them and to share the wisdom of the Church's teachings.

I also encourage you to pray for your dead, visit our parish columbarium, and participate (as you're able) in our <u>Divine Mercy Chaplet</u> every Tuesday at 12:30 PM.
