After that, we'll review whether the opportunity serves a legitimate need.

For Ordinary Time, I'll be starting a five-week homily series on the biblical notion of mercy and our call to be a People of Mercy. I'm grateful to our parish Mercy Committee for their suggestions and guidance for these homilies.

After all the Masses this weekend, my new book from Our Sunday Visitor, <u>Way of</u> <u>the Cross for Loved Ones Who Have Left the Faith</u>, is available in the narthex. The devotional was written to be a spiritual resource to help get loved ones back to church.

Tomorrow, as a nation, we honor the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, and all the Civil Rights Leaders in our nation's history. May their legacy and sacrifice convict us all, and call us all to greater racial harmony and social tranquility as a people.

In honor of the holiday, the church building and Parish Office will be closed. We will not have public Mass. All the events during the day are suspended. We will, however, still have the Holy Hour and Confessions on Monday evening from 7:00 - 8:00 PM. All are welcome!

This Wednesday, our new President will be sworn in. We pray for him and for his leadership of our country.

Some things happening around the parish:

Over the past couple of weeks, we have been able to give grants from our Charitable Fund. The parish gave a large grant to <u>HOPE in Lancaster</u>, <u>Culture of Life Africa</u>, as well as donations to some of our smaller sister parishes who are in great need of assistance.

Some of you may have noticed the improved landscaping around campus, as well as the new line of trees along the railway near the statue of Our Lady. These are a few initiatives we've taken to help beautify and enhance our campus.
