From Father Kirby...

In our devotional life, May is the month in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I encourage everyone to look for some additional devotion or penance to do this month for Our Lady.

Next Sunday, May 11, we'll have our annual May Procession and Crowning of Our Lady at our 11:00 AM Mass. Things will be a little different this year since – due to weather patterns - we're moving the outdoor Crowning to May and the indoor Crowning to December. And so, the Mass on May 11 will begin as usual in the church. After the Mass, there will be a procession to the statue of Our Lady at the entrance of the campus and the crowning of the outdoor statue. After the procession and May Crowning, we'll have Fellowship near the flags. All are welcome to come and honor Our Lady!

Some things happening at the parish this week:

Every month for Nocturnal Adoration, we try to give out a free book. I evaluate the right books to give out, but then rely on donors to help make it happen. Next Saturday, May 10, from 9:00 AM - 12 Noon, we'll have one of our periodic Formation Days. For this Formation Day, we'll talk about *The Biblical Roots and Spiritual Power of the Papacy*. If we have a new pope by then, we'll also go over his biography and try to learn about our new universal shepherd. All are welcome!

Thanks be to God, in the coming weeks, work will resume on our Lourdes Hill and Mary's Grotto. The diocese and Comporium have worked out some contractual items and (finally) a pivotal power box has been moved to a different location. This now clears the way for us to begin grading Lourdes Hill. In addition, the weather is improving and so we can begin to work on the gradual slopes that will give us safe and easy access to Mary's Grotto. All things considered, we should have the Lourdes Hill and Mary's Grotto completed by early July!

Some other events I'd like to highlight:

On Monday, May 12, at 7:00 PM, we have our monthly Stations of the Cross for those who have left the practice of the Faith. Come and walk the Stations!

On Saturday, May 17, there will be no Confessions at 3:00 PM. I'll be away giving a Day of Recollection to our sister parish in Blythewood. We will still have Solemn Vespers at 4:00 PM.

On Sunday, May 18, at 12:30 PM, we'll have a fellowship for my 50th birthday! I can't believe I'm turning 50?! But I look very forward to celebrating my 50th with the parish family!

As an aside, a priest's 50th birthday is the milestone when the Church begins to instruct him to prepare for his retirement (which usually isn't until 70 or 75 years old). When a Religious priest retires (ie, Franciscans, Jesuits, etc), he goes back to his Order's Motherhouse. When a diocesan priest retires, we're on our own. With only a small pension, we have to find housing and provide for our expenses. This is why the Church advises priests to start the beginnings of their preparation for retirement when they turn 50. And so, in answer to the inquiries of some, if you want to give a gift – and I expect nothing – please consider a monetary gift toward investments and savings for my priest retirement.

For the past couple of years, we've been following a "chief of staff" model for the parish staff. Ryan Kubic has served as the Lay Administrator in this capacity. As the parish grows and business and pastoral demands increase, a broader pastoral structure is needed. And so, we're moving to a "team model" in which different directors supervise and facilitate essential areas of the parish.

Ryan Kubic is now our Business Manager and is in charge of all financial, business, and contractual areas of the parish. MJ Wallace is now the Pastoral Associate and is responsible for the faith formation, hospitality, liturgical planning, and pastoral outreach of the parish. Monty Bennett is in charge of sacred music and assists with liturgical planning. Wesley Dry is responsible for the care and maintenance of the buildings and grounds of our parish.

It will take us some time as a parish to fully become accustomed to our new structure. As a help, please review the chart of our <u>Pastoral Structure</u>.
